THE ENGLISH PARLIAMENT. A despatch dated London, 17th, says the morning papers officially announce that Parliament will meet on January 17th. The Cabinet has decided to ask Parliament to vote a grant of money for such increase of the British army as the present state of

Europe demands. The Standard explains that the victory of the Russians is not the cause of summoning Parliament, but the license which is given Russia by Germany and Austria to use the victory in her own way. This is what constitutes the danger to British interests.

The Times says :- " By the time Parliament meets the Government will, perhaps, be able to show that our interests in some way are attacked, but for the present the country, however irritated by Russian ambition and Servian treason, cannot believe itself in any danger."
