

The Northern Light. The Northern Light has recently com pleted her repairs on the slip at Pictou. The P. E. I. Patroit states she has been furnished with new pumps and breasthooks. Heavy new beams have been placed over the boilers; a new stem of oak has been put in covered with iron plates three inches thick, lapping over each side ten inches. The iron plating of the bow fits neatly under these plates. A perfectly smooth surface is thus presented to the ice. Her stern is also plated with three quarter iron. A new iron rudder post, large enough to resist any pres sure of ice, has been fitted in. A new rudder has been made with a seven inch shaft. A new wheel house has been placed on the deck, and new wheels have been supplied. A number of repairs and improvements have been made in the in ternal arrangements of the ship, which will make her much more comfortable than she was last winter. THE COST OF SELLING GOODS:-The Monetary Times says:- "Amongst the dry goods trade, we are told of old and carefully conducted houses whose goods cost them to sell, after being duty paid and delivered in warehouse, eight and a half to nine per cent. One whose turn over in a certain year was \$750,000, ex,

pended \$67,000, or nine per cent in partners' and business expenses and bad debts. And there are firms whose trade costs even more than this to conduct, although, on the other hand where supply accounts are numerous, the relative expense is lessened. Houses which do not employ travellers, and whose business is managed with experienced skill, find it impossible to reduce their percentage of expense below seven. A gentlemen who has spent a life time in the trade, expresses the opinion that a well conducted dry goods wholesale trade requires at least six per cent to cover business (aside from personal) expenses, depreciation and bad debts. GREAT FIRES. - The American Architect

"We have seen four of these large fires in the last eleven years. There is not a town in the United States big enough to furnish food for one that is not liable to one at any time. As towns grow bigger and more crowded, the danger of them increases, and the means of resisting them do not keep pace with it. All the while we know well-at least, those of us who have taken trouble to find out, know, and any one may know-that in other countries ways of building have been devised and are in constant use, which prevent such fires ever occurring We know that the mob which had unchecked control of Paris in 1870 tried hard for two or three days to burn it, and could only burn single buildings here and there. We know that the expense of such ways of building is found to be a less burden to a community than the losses they guard against, and that they are adopted by nations far less wealthy and powerful, and, as we fancy, less enterprising than ourselves. The only obstacles in the way of our adopting them are the common apathy and ignorance, and the unwillingness of individuals to submit to restrictions which are necessary for the
