Fish-Culture—a Fraud. A very interesting article on the subject of Fish Culture in Canada which appeared in the "Canadian Illustrated News" was referred to in last week's issue of the ADVANCE. said the data of the article was fairly correct and we hope, for the sake of all the interests involved, that the Choice Congou Tea, same imposition that is attempted upon the public by those who have reported in reference to the Miramichi establishment has not rendered the figures connected with the other Hatching Houses equally unreliable. Total. 5,795,000 The number of ova actually in the Miramichi establishment is not more than, say 240,000, and we cannot understand why the work done by it is so persistently misrepresented through official channels. Investigations that we have made from time to time convince us that it has, unfortunately, proved a failure each year since it was established, and it remains to be seen. after the coming Spring's freshet is

Will the News tell us who the members were who were informed of the fact that Mr. Austin intended to bring up the resolution he had withdrawn, as an amendment to the Secretary's motion to go into Committee of Supply? The fact that Mr. Austin did not even arrange with any member to second his resolution—and it is well known such was the fact-would convince anyone but the Editor of the News that our statement was entirely correct. We think the News ought to defend

itself against charges we have made against its own veracity, before attempting to fight the Times' battles. When it stated last month that a certain Bathurst gentleman was the author of its "Roving Special" letters, in which the Editor of this paper and other North Shore gentlemen were abused, and North Shore interests were scandalously misrepresented, we intimated that it was guilty of falsehood. It has conveniently forgotten to deny the charge or produce any evidence that it did not state the untruth, which it might do by publishing an acknowledgment of the authorship of those letters from the gentleman it named. Engagements are made with assistants, and liabilities contracted with merchants-all required by the nature of the fishery and suggested by experience and common business prudence. The same may be said, to a large extent, concerning those engaged in the Bass fishery of the lower Miramichi waters. Is it, then, a right thing for the Department at Ottawa, without a moment's warning and in a way more secret than considerate or intelligent, to wait until those preparations are made and expenses incurred, and then to come down suddenly and render them valueless-a loss to a class of toilers who, in most cases, must suffer priva-

tion in consequence? What the fisheries of this County-Salmon, Bass, Gaspereaux and othersrequire is intelligent Regulation and Protection instead of the prohibitions which have grown into favor with the Department. Will any reasonable person say that because the Department has allowed over-fishing and consequent destruction of the bass fishery, to certain extent in the Northwest, it would be justified in prohibiting scoop nets there altogether? Reason would suggest that the number of such nets should be limited, which can be done in several ways, both directly and indirectly, and we believe those who reap the most benefit from that particular fishery would join heartily in discussing and agreeing to any intelligent mode of

arresting the destruction which now threatens and, at the same time, conserving the interests of the fishermen themselves. It is clearly neither right nor necessary to prohibit seining for Gaspereaux, while the absolute prohibition of Bass fishing in Napan, Black River, etc., is not to be defended. In any case the issue of the prohibitory Order on the eve of the season's work and when preparations for it were about completed is so much of a hardship upon the people interested as to justify

A STRANGE AFFAIR. NEW YORK, April 5 .- A terrific explosion occurred to-day in Jewett's white lead works on Front street. The police and firemen arrived hurriedly, and entering the building, met at the second floor stairway, Joseph Dean, a member of the firm, in a crippled condition. Up stairs, George W. Jewett, aged 61, of Port Richmond, and Orville D. Jewett, aged 35, of Orange, New Jersey, were found in convulsions on the floor. The former expired in a few minutes. He was badly wounded, and his clothes were on fire in several places. The floor was covered with soot and smeared with blood. Portions of a conical shell or hand grenade were found embedded in the walls and ceiling. The theory of the police is that George and Orville Jewett became involved in a dispute, and

The Times of the 6th will publish from an authentic source, a true story of the explosion. Orville D. Jewett was admitted to the firm of which his father, when alive was a member, six or seven years ago, simply because of that relationship. has been somewhat wild and paid little attention to business. He had been absent the past winter yachting at Bermuda, and on his return recently, expressed a desire to withdraw from the firm. His partners did not wish to make any change in the business and opposed his retiring, but he persisted and finally became so disagreeable that they conceded to his request and agreed to pay him \$200,000 for his interest

were to be signed to-day. Young Jewett, probably crazed with liquor, came to the office armed with a hand-grenade, a pistol and a dirk. Some words passed, when he pulled the grenade from his pocket and threw it on the floor. In the explosion following his uncle was killed, his own legs broken, and he received three terrible wounds in the abdomen. He then drew a pistol and attempted to shoot himself through the head, but his aim was ineffective. He died this evening in a hospital. Dean, who was injured by the explosion, is understood to be in dangerous condition.

A HIGH HANDED ACT. Iowa City, Iowa. April 5 .- Six men, supposed to be monte operators, attempted to abduct Mrs. George W. Jackson says he was in a room above when the explosion occurred. and rushing to the door, he lo ked through a broken pane in the rear door of the office. and saw two bodies on the floor. Then four shots were fired, whereupon Jackson ran round to the main door. On entering that the shell must have been used by one he met Taintor on the threshold of the inner door, as if just coming out.

> THE ANGLIN PRINTING CHARGES. OTTAWA, April 8th. - In the Commons esterday Mr. Bowell moved in amendment to going into Supply, that it is inexto enter into any agreement or contract whereby public money is paid to members of Parliament, such as the Postmaster General's reports for 1875 and 1876, and vouchers laid on the table of the House show to have been paid to Timothy Warren Anglin, member of the House for Glouces. ter-viz., \$8.126.31 for the year ending June, 1875, and \$10,263.94 for the year ending June, 1876, and \$2,709.55 for the quarter ending Sept., 1876-in payment for printing done by him for the Post Office Department, per agreement, as shown by the return laid before Parliament, as such payments are in contravention of the Independency of Parliament Act. This he supplemented by a speech containing a violent attack on the Government for having gone back on the principles they advocated while in Opposition.

Mr. Mackenzie replied, reading all the

correspondence in relation to the subject. showing that when the present Government came into power, Postmaster General Macdonald ordered all printing being done in the Maritime Provinces to be taken from papers in opposition to the then Govern ment, and given to those in favor of it, and instructed Mr. McMillan, Post-Office Inspector at St. John, to send the printing to the Freeman office. When Mr Huntington became Postmaster General he discovered this fact, and brought it to the notice of the Cabinet, when orders were immediately sent to Mr. McMillan to cease giving printing to offices in the Maritime Provinces. He replied, stating that Chubb & Co. had a large stock of paper on hand, procured especially for this purpose, and that serious loss to them would result if printing were stopped Chubb & Co. also wrote to the Postmaster General, asking that they be treated with ordinary business courtesy and not put to great loss, which the removal of the printing would occasion them. In reply the Post Master General directed that printing be done to the extent of the stock of stationery on hand, equal to all printing necessary for three months' use, the Post Master General being willing either to purchase the stationery on hand at market value or allow printing to be done at contract rates, all printing to cease when the stationery on hand was exhausted, and in future all supplies of this kind to be obtained from Ottawa.
