On the recommendation of the Honor able the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. and under the provisions of the "The fisheries Act,"—His Excellency has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that, that part of the Revised Fishery Regulations for the County of Northumber land, in the Province of New Brunswick, adopted in Council on the 28th of April, 1875, I ving reference to seining for Gaspereaux and Bass, be, and the same is hereby amended as follows:—

"The use of seines for the purpose "catching Gaspereaux and Bass is prohi-"bited in the main River Miramichi, the "North and South West Branches, the "Bay du Vir., and Black Rivers, and in "the Miramichi Bay and Harbour." His Excellency has also been pleased to order, that the Fishery Regulation estab-lished by Order in Council of the 6th day

of March, 1876, permitting fishing for Bass in the Napan and Black Rivers in the County of Northumberland, in the Province of New Brunswick, and along the shores of the main River Miramichi between the mouths of Napan and Black until the 25th day of May in each year, be and the same is hereby rescinded.
