A St. Petersburg despatch of 27th ult. says:-A Cabinet Council was held on Saturday, at which, it is reported, the Peace party obtained the postponement of a declaration of war.

In the suit against the rector and wardens of St. Mark's Church, Philadelphia to restrain them from the ringing of the chimes of the church on the ground that their sound was a nuisance, the court granted the injunction prayed for.

A number of Turks, including soldiers, pillaged Goraumci Island on the Danube. A detachment of Roumanian troops captured thirteen of the party, including the Turkish soldiers. The leader of the marauders, who was a Turkish official from Rustchuk, and another Turk, were killed.
