Pulling Down a Barn.

On Thursday last the preliminary examination of William Simpson, on a charge of pulling down and demolishing a barn, the property of Alex. Loggie, Esq., situated in the Parish of Alnwick, in August, 1876, took place before Police Magistrate Blair. The witnesses examined were Alex. Loggie, Jacob Price, Mary Elizabeth McKenna, Alex. J. W. McKenna and John McKenna, all of whom appeared for the Crown.

The evidence showed that the defendant had formerly owned the property on which the barn was situated, and sold it to complainant, remaining on it, as tenant, for nearly a year, and while the property was in his possession, the barn was demolished. One witness had seen defendant going towards the barn with an axe, before it was down, and another had seen him taking the boards off it, while a third had purchased some of the boards for six shillings which he said he would not part with for as many dollars. 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An Important \$2.50 Suit. A case of considerable interest was tried before Jas. T. Griffin, Esq., J. P., on Monday last. The facts, as developed during the proceedings were about as follows:—

In 1860, a piece of land known as the "Johnston Property" was leased to Mr. Desbray for three years, by J. H. Peters, Esq., (formerly of Miramichi), but now one of the Judges of P. E. I. On the expiry of the lease, Alex. Morrison, Esq., succeeded to his own property, and he intended in his own mind to open negotiations with Judge Peters for its purchase. Mr. Morrison offered \$800 for it at first, but Judge Peters held it at \$800 and, after some time was spent in negotiations between the parties, directly, as well as through the late Geo. Kerr, Esq., who was Judge Peters' agent in Miramichi, Mr. Morrison agreed with Mr. Kerr to give the price asked and Mr. Kerr wrote his principal to that effect, closing his letter with the words, "so you have all your own way."

Mr. Morrison informed Mr. Kerr that in May, when the time for which the property was leased expired, and Mr. Kerr told Mr. Morrison that he might, from the time the bargain was closed, treat the property as his own. Thereupon Mr. Morrison proceeded to build on the property and after he had invested about \$1000 in that way it occurred to him that it was time the deed was in his possession. Mr. Kerr having died in the meantime, he thereupon applied to Judge Peters for the deed, but, to his surprise, he was told to go to the Justice to get the deed.
