By the time the finny gentleman is secured he (the angler) can sympathize pretty fully with the stoker who plies his vocation within the tropics. As he sits contemplating his game in silent satisfac. tion an involuntary bath by falling overboard while engaged in fighting millions of sanguinary mosquitoes and black flies, is positively refreshing.
