If you want to ship fresh fish those patent refrigerator cars will secure you, as far as security in such perishable commodities can go, against loss, having all the recent improvements. There are cattle cars, box cars, oil cars and platform cars in readiness for any emergency with careful attention bestowed on live or risky freight.

In the Station is a branch of Molson's Bank. This may be an accommodation in some manner that we fail to see, to the financial department of the railway. It however, struck us as somewhat singular to find a private corporation furnished with rooms in a Government building where it was evident there was no room to spare, if enough. It may be that our Rulers tax the country for the purpose of erecting houses to rent and, if this is so the country should know it as soon as possible. We dont pretend to say that the matter is not all right not knowing the circumstances and the probability is that we never will know them.

THE BUSINESS OF THE ROAD. Nothing surprised us more than the business which this road is developing Although as yet it does not pay directly there is no doubt but that it will in time. In any case it is a national undertaking and, as such, the whole country will receive the benefit of it. No one pretends to say that the money expended on ordinary roads bridges, harbours etc., is returned directly to the Treasury and none will deny that, they are not only useful but necessary-a benefit to the whole people. There are two regular trains both waysan express and an accommodation-each and every week-day to say nothing of specials mostly carrying through freight. These latter are despatched to the extent of from three to six trains per week and are general y run by night.






