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

The area of the City of the Saints large; so large that if given without any further explanations the conclusions at which the reader would arrive could not be otherwise than delusive and exaggerated. It may, for the most part, be likened to the suburbs of a small modern town far removed from the bustle and turmoil of the great highways of trade. On the outskirts every house has a few acres of land attached, all under cultivation. By the side of the thrifty orchard may be seen patches of sorghum, potatoes and all kinds of vegetables with stacks of hay and grain in some quiet corner. The sound of the old-fashioned flail or the voice of the farmer gently urging on his horse in field operations occasionally breaks the almost oppressive stillness. Further on a laughing party of children are enjoying themselves among the fruit trees, their sports being mostly supervised by some person whose experience has been tempered by additional years. In no case are the juniors allowed to play in the streets, being thus cut off from many sources of information which only lead to evil. It is almost impossible to estinate the benefits which the human family would derive from a like course cursued by the inhabitants of all towns and villages. The knowledge in the ways of sin which one child possesses is comparatively small, but if we make a joint stock of the information on forbidden subjects which each has picked up the accumulation becomes something hideous and awful. While young folks are engaged in earnest play, for which previous restraint has given due zest, the desire to exhibit demoralizing accomplishments is held in abeyance; but as soon as this flags, then the streets are broad highways which can only lead to moral ruin and death. We saw many young people going to, or returning from school, or on errands; but there was no lagging or protracted talks between those who happened to meet, nor any business portion of the city the fields become more contracted; the gardens smaller.
