

[By our Travelling Observer.] Shippegan, as is well known, is a fishing village and extends along the shore of its tine harbor for a mile or more. We were fortunate or unfortunate enough to arrive in time for the first gale of the season, and should say that Shippegan gales must class A l. It blew a Northeaster for two days steadily, and Shippegan and the stranger within its gates remained in doors. As there is no railway to Shippegan, strangers don't visit it very often, and outsiders are very apt to regard it as one of those places which are stuck on the map to make a coast look habitable, and as the gale would

not let us out, we let ourselves into the commercial affairs of Shippegan as far as we were able. The fishing business is conducted largely in schooners of about 13 tons, some 20 of which are engaged in it. The population of the Parish is about 1,800. The firms which have curing and fishing estadishments here, are Wm. Fruing & Co., N. E. side; Wm. Taylor, Esq., in the village; John Leboutilier & Co. of Gaspe (under the management of Francis W. Alexandre, Esq., one of the firm), Indian Point; Richard Young, Little Lameck; Robert Young, Little Shippegan. During the present summer the Robins of Caraquet had also a branch down here, and Mr. Thos. Cabot, tavern keeper, acts as general agent for Mr. Rive of Caraquet. Some of these firms have as many as 19 open boats and a couple of schooners, others smaller fleets. Of small boats there are about 150, of from 7 to 10 tons mostly whale boats, and which employ from 2 to 3 men each, while the schooners employ from 3 to 4 men apiece. The average

some of the schooners being built and owned by the men themselves. The average quantity of oil per quintal is ? of a gallon, and the shipments from 5,000 to 7,000 quintals of cod, a good deal of this going to the Mediterranean. The catch of herring was from 4,000 to 5,000 barrels. The large fishing establishments are pretty much the same in their general features, and consist, 1st of a manager's house, and a large piece of ground covered with fish flakes, around which, here and there, or grouped together, are a variety of buildings, large and small, such as blacksmiths' shops, cook house, salt store, oil store, etc., with a wharf running out on the flats containing the green fish stage, covered by a large building where the fish, already gutted are received from the boats; and a large dry fish store. The ground is so low in these localities, that in the fall, the sea thinks nothing of coming ashore, and even invading the sacred precints of the house of the manager, who has to walk round in a canoe, should he not already have taken his de-
