



The Clergy and the Creeds. A correspondent of a leading Scotch newspaper signing himself "A Lay Heretic," discusses at length the question, as to how far a minister, may find himself out of harmony with the doctrinal standards of his church, before feeling bound to leave it. The Church. whatever it may be, says "if you don't like us, leave us," and the Toronto Mail remarks this is apparently fair enough, but there is another side of the question. "The Lay Heretic" urges that the Minister "out of harmony" with the standards of his denomination, ought to hold on to his pulpit, for he argues that increased experience and study may convince a man that his creed does not honestly represent the truth, and that the chances are that the church herself is as apt to be behind time, as the minister is to be in error.
