YOUNG CANADA.

Fox Island Letter.

FOX ISLAND, 25th JUNE 1877. DEAR ADVANCE :- You have wondered doubt why it is, that your Correspondent has kept silence this season. I must lead want of time and dearth of news. Things are going on in the same old fashion down here. T. W. Crocker is still to be found on Champion Point icing away. Brother Jonathan's burly form and smiling face, is still to be seen in the 'early morn, 'and dewy eve," pacing along, the sandy beaches; and the representative of the "Miramichi fish market," this season, is to be found at the Gully Harbour Master Brown has had the Gully Buov laid down by Mr. A Palmer, master of the schooner Virginie. A fair catch of salmon has been made here so far this season; the shad have been a failure; they will not be missed a great deal if the salnon are plentiful. Lobsters have put in an appearance. I have heard the lobster fishermen say that they are plentiful in the deep water, but will not make the shore in any quantity; no doubt the heavy winds now prevailing have kept them off. It is rather strange, but if the lobsters

are ever so thick in the shoal water (and they come in very close to the shore) they will, before heavy northerly and easterly winds, make off for the deep water. There is no better sign of approaching heavy winds, than when the lobsters move suddenly off in the deep water. There is no establishment on Fox Is-

land for preserving lobsters in tin cans. Mr. Andrew Wells, has put up this spring an establishment on Huckleberry Island for preserving these fish, and he is now busily engaged in that business. His place is one of the best arranged in this parish for the purpose and if the lobsters are a fair catch this season, Mr. Wells will, no doubt, put up a large quantity.

Mr. Daniel Lewis of Escuminac informed me that last week the codfish were very plentiful at Herring Cove and he took a large number in his salmon nets, a very rare thing to do.

I cannot tell you anything about the gaspereaux, as the gaspereaux fishermen now are a thing of the past down here, since seining for those fish has been prohibited. The Advocate and the Inspector will, no doubt compare the number of bbls. exported from Miramichi this season with last season's export, and then we will hear what that sanctified journal and the Inspector have done for posterity in advising the Government to put in force regulations that prohibit fishermen from taking fish that Providence has been kind

enough to send to their doors. As I am writing I may mention that I saw a bass that was caught the 18th of this present month (June) at Bay du Vin 38 Island, and not spawned then, and I should say that it would not spawn for two or three weeks. 


