Our correspondent directs attention to the fact that Overseer Hogan and some relatives of his, as well as others well known as adherents of a certain politician, always figure in the Departmental accounts as recipients of pretty large sums for procuring salmon for breeding purposes. They have complained of not having had good facilities for capturing the parent fish and attributed the discrepancy between the cost of capture and the results attained to this cause. It was well known that Mr. Henderson had a fine seine, so Overseer Wyse was induced to advise him to violate the regulation prohibiting seining for gaspereaux, in order that when he fell into the trap his seine might be seized come into Overseer Hogan's possession. The plot worked like a charm. Mr. Henderson used the seine, as advised by the Chatham Overseer, and other officers were on the watch as detectives. These were Inspector Venning, Overseer Hogan and Mr. Shaesgreen—the three persons who draw most largely from the Fish breeding that these men have not disposed of the seine as the law requires, but have appropriated it to their own use and have been hauling for salmon with it up the Northwest, on Shad ground, School House Rapids, etc. It will, doubtless, be found that these men who got possession of Mr. Henderson's seine under the disreputable circumstances stated, will make the Department pay roundly for the use of administration, but so long as it receives official and semi-official sanction those who are losers by it may sue in vain for redress.
