CHURCH RIVER LIGHTS :- It will be good news to the promoters of the petition for the establishing by the Dominion Government of lights at the Indian settlement of Church River, to learn that although the Marine Department could not do all that was asked in the matter, it has promised to make an allowance to the extent of 60 gallons of oil per season for the maintenance of the service, which the petitioners state has been kept up by the Indian Chief there at his own expense for two years. The Department takes the view that these lights are not intended to secure the safety vessels navigating the Miramichi, but rather for the convenience of the small craft and boats of the locality, and that, therefore, they cannot be placed on the same footing as the lighthouses and beacons, which are a part of the service in connection with the general navigation of the river.
