M. BOURGEOIS. Cabinet of 1893, asked of the French Parliament permission to prosecute ten Senators and Deputies who were implicated in the Panama scandals.

When he was attacked during the trials he resigned his office in order to be free to defend himself. After he had fully vindicated himself before the courts and

in the Parliament, too, he again accepted the portfolio of Justice at the request of the Ministry.

He tried to construct a Cabinet for President Carnot last May, but failed. He is forty-four years old. His political creed was declared in a circular issued to the people of his district two years ago in which he pronounced in favor of "civil and political liberty, freedom of worship, social equality and safety."
