Farmers and others who are interested in silos will be interested in the following by C. P. Goodrich in the Prairie Farmer, which we take from The Co-operative Farmer and Maritime Dairyman :-

I will now describe what I consider the best form of silo yet invented, and the style more often built now than any other. It is built of wood, and is round. The studding need be only 2x4, the inside lining being twothick nesses of half inch boards six inches wide with tar paper between. The boards are bent around so that each board is a hoop, and it can be made any height desired and with no danger of springing out. This is very important, because the deeper the siles the better the ensilage will keep, other things being equal. The outside covering can be made in the same way, the last put on being ship-lap. Doors can be cut through at i tervals of three or four feet. The advantages of a round silo are : It takes less lumber has no corners for the ensilage to spoil in, as it is apt to do in a rectangular one, is Snowball, bal stronger and will keep its shape, and can be made very deep. The best siles I know of are round and made in the centre of round barns, There are several of them in Wisconsin. The first I knew of was planned by Prof. F. H. King, of the Wisconsin University. It is in the centre of a round barn ninety-two feet in diameter, and thirty-four feet deep. This makes it very

convenient to feed, and the ensilage keeps The ventilation of the barn is up between the onter and inner linings of the silo. This dries out the wood as fast as the ensilage is fed out. It is very important to have the silo lining dried out as soon as possible to prevent rotting.
