The Bangor Commercial says :- "What are regarded as very fair estimates place the loss to Aroostoock farmers in consequence of the great slump in prices of potatoes this spring at \$275,000. These are figures sent out from the agricultural department at Augusta. Farmers who held their potatoes at \$2 per barrel are selling them to the starch factories for 30 cents. per barrel.
