The Manitoba School Question. In publishing the reply of the government of Manitoba to the remedial order made by the Dominion governon the subject of Schools in that province, the ADVANCE intimated that it opened a way for an amicable settlement of existing difficulties without it being necessary for the Ottawa authorities to legislate in the matter. Despatches from Ottawa which are in another column show that the Governor-General and his advisers are of the same opinion, hence no bill dealing with the Manitoba schools will be introduced during the present session of Parliament. It will be observed that there are rumors of defections in the Ministry because of the decision arrived at, but the French members named in the despatches will hardly act so childishly as to carry out their alleged intentions. OTTAWA, JULY 8. - The intense excitement which has existed in political circles here since it became known on Friday last that the government had decided not to introduce remedial legislation on the school question, culminated in the official announcement to both houses this afternoon. "I desire to state that the government has had under consideration the reply of the Manitoba legislature to the remedial order of the 21st of March, 1895, and after careful deliberation has arrived at the following conclusion: Though there may be difference of opinion as to exact meaning of the reply in question, the government believes that it may be interpreted as holding out some hope of amicable setrlement of the Manitoba school question on the basis of possible action by the Manitoba government and legislature, and the Dominion government is most unwilling to take any action which can be interpreted as forestalling or precluding such a desirable consummation.
