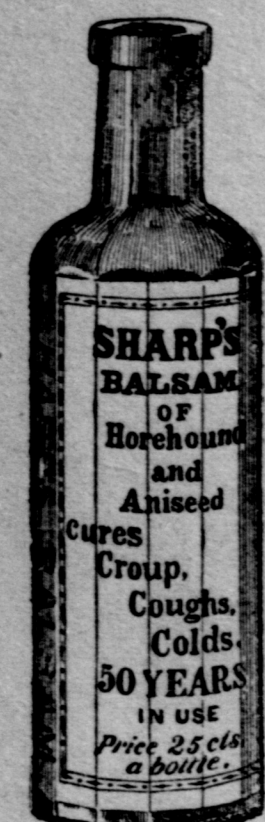

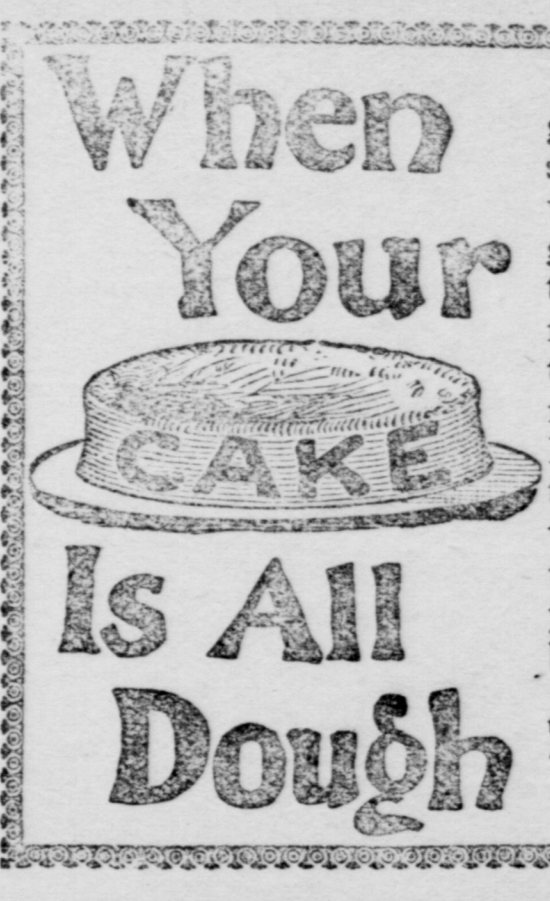

Tom Mann, the English agitator, was arrested at Hamburg and sent out of the country. The ratpayers of the town of Maitsonville, P. Q., have voted on the by-law to grant a bonus of ten thousand dollars to the brewery and distillery companies.

Christmas fruits and groceries of all kinds are in full supply at the wholesale store of Northrup & Co. There have been no changes in the market during the last few days.

Low Angeles, Cal., Nov. 27.—The pretty little airport tower of San Pedro, near Los Angeles, was destroyed by a cyclone which struck the town on Tuesday night.

The Quebec Court of Review gave judgment on Monday unanimously confirming the decision of the Superior Court concerning Ernest Picard's appeal to refund to the Quebec Government the sum of \$100,000 paid to him in connection with the Bule des Chalmers railway deal.

Electric dark lanterns have been supplied to Paris police, enabling them to see 150 feet away. Anaesthetics caused 61 deaths last year in the United Kingdom, 52 due to chloroform.

Portable electric lamps, fed by accumulators, the total weight of each set being 44 pounds, are now used in the collieries at Skul, Hungary. The lamp gives 13 to 2 candle-power for 10 hours.

Experiments are being made in European countries with alcohol for lighting purposes. The flame of alcohol is scarcely visible, but incandescent burners make it possible to get brilliant light from any source of sufficient heat.

A lion-faced boy recently exhibited in Berlin, Stephen Salmayyar, has the face entirely covered with blonde hair, with the exception of the eyelids and red portions of the lips, and the hair is very thick on his back.

The earliest type of man, supposed to have originated in Asia, was pictured in the German Anthropological Society, at its last meeting, by Dr. Ranke. This man was "acryphalic," having a head large in comparison with the face, and the base of the skull was oblique.

From an investigation in the Sanvica district, Mr. Ig, of the Yokohama College of Science, concludes that the tidal wave of June had its origin in a submarine explosion about 200 leagues to the eastward, or in N. lat. 39° E. long. 149°.
