NOTICE TO HOLDERS OF TIMBER LICENSES

CHATHAM, N. B., 24th Dec., 1896.

Attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is called to Section 19 of the Timber Regulations,

which reads as follows: "No Spruce or Fir trees shall be cut by any Licensee under any License, not even for poles, which will not make a log of at least 15 feet in length and ten inches at the small end, and if any such shall be cut, the Licensee shall be liable to double stumpage and all Licenses are hereby notified, that for the future, the provisions of this section will be strictly enforced"

A WORLD BUT HALF EXPLORED—A MARVEL AMONG BOOKS—GENERAL NEWS NOTES, ETC.

Alexander sighed for more worlds to conquer when he knew loss of the world we inhabit than is known by an ordinary schoolboy of to-day.

We puzzle our brains about Mars and the doings of its inhabitants while we are imperfectly acquainted with the topography of our own planet and have unravelled but few of the mysteries of its vegetable and animal life.

A Frenchman planted a seed, watched it as it germinated, sent a stalk upward, budded, flowered and produced fruit; he saw the results but could not explain how they were produced.

Sir John Lubbock studied an ant hill six months and concluded that on some lines the ants were a good deal more intelligent than himself.

Some of us remember a time when it was generally thought that the world was created out of nothing but a few thousand years ago; the fossilized remains of horses and some other animals have been discovered in Arizona which science demonstrates to be not less than 2,000,000 years old.

A man digging a well in order to obtain a supply of water for his stock, in a western town a few weeks ago, at a depth of 18 feet found oil instead of water; oil was not known to exist anywhere in that region.

What is called mineral oil is by some scientific men, said to come from the carcasses of the mastodons and other huge animals that had existed in prehistoric times.

Now it is suspected that the mastodon may be found roaming around in some parts of Alaska that have never been visited by white men.

Canada has a territory much larger than the Maritime Provinces about which we know hardly more than we know of the moon, and a considerable portion of Newfoundland has never been explored.

Earp, referee of fight, pleaded guilty to-day of carrying concealed weapon, and was fined \$50, which he paid.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—There is no longer any doubt that the decision in Wednesday's fight was the culmination of a successful scheme to "job" not alone Fitzsimmons out of the \$10,000, but also to make a general "clear up" all over the country.

At noon Wednesday, or over twelve hours before the men entered the ring, a telegram was received in this city, from Needham, Sharkey's trainer, to John Ryan, which had two words, "Cannot lose."

Ryan is business partner of Paddy Ryan and Pete Riley, and with this sort of information in their pockets, Ryan and Riley began to take in the currency at prices ranging from 5 and 3 to 1 to even.

Mr. Bachman, a bookmaker, who had heavily on the fight, laid 5 to 1 on Fitzsimmons with Ryan. Marcy Blumenthal let 3 to 1 with Riley. The pair managed to clean up a handsome sum on the fight.

Bachman has already paid the money to Ryan. Blumenthal, however, takes the ground that he never had a chance to win, and therefore will not pay up.

The men who managed to steal, and in fact all who were party to it should be classified as common thieves.

Any one who made a bet on the result, regardless of what he did in the fight, robbed the man he bet with just as much as though he picked his pocket.

A large building collapsed at Jerez, Spain, on the 10th inst., burying over one hundred persons.

It is reported that the residents of the Hawaiian Islands are desirous of securing annexation to the United States.
