M Ronald refused all offers for a lower price than \$3,600, although he had offered to present the town with a full set of spiral springs and a flange neck for our Amoskeag engine. He had insisted that his engine had fulfilled all tests. He had been questioned about his No. 3 engine which he had sold to Newcastle at \$3,000, but he said he did not make that pattern of engine now. Ald. Nicol wanted to hear from Ald.

Ald. Loggie said he was not as practical in judging of the value of the engine as he would like to be. Mr. Rouald had offered the engine to the old fire board for \$3,200; as to payment he had no knowledge. Mr. Ronald may have based his price on receiving 5% bonds in payment and, hence, named a lower price than that in his present tender. He wished also to direct the attention of the Council to the fact that if payment was on a basis of 4% bonds he wanted his \$3,600 but if it was on 5% bonds it wou'd be \$4,000. Mr. Ronald did not supply the hose included in his former offer yet he deducted only \$800, while, on a basis of cash he should deduct \$880. It was also a question as to whether the 4% bonds of Chatham, as an incorporated town, were unincorporated. The Council was, of course, not bound to buy the engine, as Mr. Ronald was asked to bring it here for test and it was stated that the Town would not be bound to buy it.

Ald. Nicol, who stated that he had been "figuring" while Ald. Loggie was talking, said the difference between the former offer made by Mr. Ronald and his present tender price was only \$80, estimating the respective offers on a basis of 5% and 4% bonds, or cash, respectively, the advantage being in favor of the higher price.

Ald. Bennett regretted that he had been absent on Thursday and Friday evenings. He said Council had nothing to do with any former offers of Mr. Rouald to the late Fire Commissioners, or with any hose reels or other things outside of his tender of Oct 15th 1896, sent in response to the Council's advertisement. That tender was for s steam fire engine and it must now be accepted or rejected. Mr. Ronald had been ask ed to bring his engine here to undergo certain tests. If he fulfilled all requirements the Council was bound to pay him the price he asked, but the Council was the sole judge as to whether requirements were fulfilled or not and as to whether it would buy the engine or not. The matter was not one to "dicker" on. They had all heard something of the merits of the engine and there was a difference of opinion as to how it had come out of the tests. Some said it had mere than fulfilled them. They should not depreciate the engine and then, perhaps, buy it. Let them think of what they were doing. Ald. Watt and all others of the Council say they are desirous of getting our fire facilities improved in order to get better fire insurance rates for the town. Are we taking the wisest course to that end? The committee's report to Council on the next evening was, therefore, a surprise. second test was demanded, Mr. Ronald made no objection, whatever, but it could do the machine no good to have it pushed so far beyond reasonable requirements as was done on Thursday afternoon. The fire committee was, evidently, under very sinister influence, and the alacrity with which the hose purchase was recommended without friction and that of the steam fire engine fought in every way, fair and unfair, is contrasted in the minds of many and suggestions not very complimentary to those who fought so hard against Mr. Ronald are

Since the foregoing was written there has been a new surprise in the form of a second report of the Town Council Fire Committee stating that the engine had failed to meet the second test. Such report is very unfair to Mr. Ronald and absolutely incorrect.
