A Port Greenville letter says: 'A few weeks ago Mrs. Wm. Parsons passed quietly away. Mrs. Parsons, or Aunt Rebecca, as she was known to the neighborhood, was perhaps the oldest lady in Port Greenville at the time of her death, being something over eighty years of age.

In this way they went to the Douglastown turning-bank, Oriana being only twenty seconds behind Leagr while Avis was also well up. They all turned wide to leeward and low ground thereby, but it was a pretty race as the three boats entered upon the windward for the lower turning point of the Masterman Pump Mill. Leagr, with only her mainmast and standing rig, drew away in a very clean manner, but Avis held stubbornly on Oriana and on the second tack crossed her bow, but then began to lose place. On the next tack, she had to give way and pass under Oriana's stern and Oriana lost a few seconds by touching bottom between Hutcheon's ballast shaft and the Lamont mill. At the lower turn Leagr led by one minute and fifty-five seconds, Oriana, in second place, being one minute and twenty seconds ahead of Avis, which had made a very pretty race in Oriana's wake for the last mile or more of that run. On the run up to make the second turn off Douglastown, Leagr increased her lead on Oriana and Oriana the latter gaining only ten seconds on her in the three miles. The remainder of the race, consisting of three miles to leeward and a mile and a half to leeward—the latter in a more moderate wind—was pretty sailing in which Leagr steadily increased her lead on Oriana and the latter led Avis at an even better rate, so that when they crossed the home line Leagr was 4 minutes and 27 seconds elapsed time ahead of Oriana, and the latter 5 minutes and five seconds elapsed time ahead of Avis. The official time was as follows:—
