Continued from 2nd page. doubt of the constitutionality of section 31. I have no doubt about that because the Supreme Court of Canada, in the Danaher case, upheld that section. If you read the judgment of Justice Gwynne you will find that those very points have been touched upon.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie : But Judge King delivered judgment the other way. Dr. Stockton : But his judgment would not upset that of the Supreme Court of Canada.

Hon Mr. Tweedie : But the judgment o the Supreme Court of Canada is on another section. Do you say that section 31 is without doubt constitutional ? Dr. Stockton : I think so.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie : Then why don't you carry it out? Dr. Stockton : Under the law you have

the right to prevent the granting of license in a parish by a petition of a majority of the ratepayers, but see the position we are placed in in St. John. There are different wards in that City, many of which have a

very large population, yet to prevent a license being granted in some of these wards we would have to have a majority of the entire City, which I say is unfair. If you want to deal fairly with the temperance people of St. John let a majority of the different wards prevent the issue of the license, and then it will soon be stopped. Hon.
