The fossil remains of more than fifteen pecies of great wingless birds, resembling those of Madagascar and New Zealand, have been collected by Carlos and Florentino Ameghino from the most ancient tertiary strata of Southern Patagonia. The best known of these species is the Phororhacus inflatus, comparable to the outrich in size but more robust, and with a vulture-like bill resembling that of the Dodo, a Mauritus bird that became extinct near the close of the seventeenth century. Another species of the same genius, the P. longissimus, was larger. Its skull was 26 inches long, being much greater than that of the horse, camel or giraffe of the present day, and its stature was scarcely less than that of the Epyornis ingens of Madagascar. But the giant of all and the most gigantic bird yet known, was the Brontornis Burmeisteri. This bird was of massive build and must have been more than 13 feet tall, the total length of the leg being 63 inches, or about 9.5 longer than that of the Epvornis ingens, while inches. Some interesting facts concerning the vegetation growing nearest the earth's Poles are given in knowledge by W. Botting Hemsley, the British botanist. In the highest western latitudes yet reached, between 80° and 83° 6' north latitude in Ellesmere Land and Grinnell Land, the last British expedition collected about 70 species of plants, including some familiar showy

ones. In favorable places the ground is carpeted with plants, many of them producing brilliant colored flowers during the short but continuous summer. In the same latitudes in Franz Josef Land, however, the plants, though of the same species, are in an extremely stunted state, with scarcely a flower to be seen, and nowhere does continuous vegetation cover more than a few square feet. Seed in these regions is seldom or never perfected, the plants increasing hy suckers, underground stems and trailing root.

stems. None of the plants, it may be remarked, are pecaliar to the localities, very few are confined to the Arotic zone, many occur widely at elevations in temperate latitudes, some even on mountains in the tropics, and a few reach the southern limits of vegetation. In the southern hemisphere, no flowering plants are known withm 35 degrees of the Pole, and countries in as high a latitude as Scotland are ice-bound. South Georgia and Macquarie Island-small islands of small elevation, both in 54° south latitude, one in the American and the other in the New Zealand region-may serve to illustrate the Antarctic flora.
