Shows Land Office, 24 July, 1896.
The attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is called to Section 19 of the Timber Regulations, which reads as follows:—
"If No Spruce or Pine trees shall be cut by any Licensee under any License, not even for piling, which will not make a log at least 18 feet in length and ten inches at the small end; and if any such shall be cut, the Licensee shall be liable to double stumpage and the License be forfeited."
