Execution at Digby.

While bird tuberculosis is easily inoculated into the rabbit, it has little effect on the guinea pig, but after having grown in other mammals, it becomes very active in the guinea pig and at the same time loses some of its effect on birds.

The name of "ceramic stone" has been given by M. Garcey a French inventor to a new building stone obtained by him from broken glass. The glass—broken bottles, window panes, etc.—is reduced to powder, different kinds are mixed of variegated color is desired, and the pulverized material is devitrified by passing successively through two furnaces, the second being one of high temperature. When a telephone is placed sufficiently near a telegraph line, yet without actual contact, certain sounds are heard on the passage of a current along the telegraph line, and by long experiment this observer has been able to separate these sounds into the characters of the Morse alphabet, and to draw up a system by which any person can learn with practice to read the message passing over the wires from the telephone sounds. This makes it practically to "tap" a telegraph line without interfering with its current or giving any indication whatever to stations along the line.

Up to this time Sheriff Van Blarcom, who is a very old man, was resting in his own room, but when told that everything was in readiness for him he promptly appeared on the scene prepared to perform his duty in a fearless manner. He, however, was not more cool or collected than the man whom he was soon to send into eternity.

The arrangement of the gallows was somewhat changed during the day. Instead of it being up in the cell in the eastern corner of the jail was erected under the platform of the main entrance to the prison.

The side walls, built of stone, and the stairway leading to the platform completely obscured the condemned man, and it was one of the dreariest looking places that I ever had my foot in. The scene was rendered most weird and distressing, especially when Wheeler stepped into it. A lantern and a lamp were used to lighten up the gloom.

Wheeler's cell was within a few feet of the death chamber, and of course he was conscious of all the movements of the officials during yesterday afternoon. When the arrangement of the scaffold were being perfected he was amazingly cool, and only more so than when he stood on the threshold of death.

Just before leaving his cell and as the door was swung open, Wheeler announced that he had taken one life for the devil, and he was now offering his own up to Jesus, and was willing to pay the penalty.

Wheeler's last words. The noose was adjusted on his neck, and the unfortunate man was asked by Chief of Police Bowles if he desired to say anything else. Wheeler responded:

"I'll, gentlemen, I have a few things to say. The confession which is to be published in the Digby Courier is the only correct one. I killed Annie Kempton between 12 and 1 o'clock at night, and it is also true that the cow had been milked the evening before between 5 and 6 o'clock. These are my last words and if I am lying before men I am not lying before God. Good by, friends. I hope you will all forgive me."

THE DEATH SCENE.

A second ladder the sheriff with his mallet and chisel severed the rope overhead and with a terrific jerk the body of the unfortunate criminal bounded upwards and his neck was heard to crack by those outside the prison walls. When the body rebounded it began to revolve, but the deputy sheriff steadied it. There was then visible for a few moments only the convulsive twitching of the arms and legs and then all was over.

Within twenty minutes after the drop the lifeless body was cut down and carried back to the cell in which the condemned man had spent his last moment.

THE CORONER'S JURY then viewed the body and returned the usual verdict.

Subsequently the deputy sheriff appeared outside and announced to the crowd that the body would be placed in the upper hall and anyone who desired to view it would be given an opportunity between 8 and 9 o'clock this morning. Hundreds satisfied their morbid curiosity.

The remains were interred about noon in the grave which had been dug for them behind the jail.
