THE DYING OF THE DISTINGUISHED SCHOOL of naturalists which England once produced, and which culminated in Darwin, is known by Prof. W. T. Reelston-Dyer, of Kentville, N.S. Without offering any explanation himself, he quotes the opinion of another well known naturalist that this is one of the results of the modern "crisis system" in which the world is now living. From the age of about eight, the boys are kept busy practicing cricket or cramming for examinations, and there is no time to think or observe. The boys must eat some other school in tennis or football, or must be some one else in the history of the Panic War.

AN ELECTRIC BILL which gives a continuous musical sound, similar to that obtained by the electric organ, is being made in England by M. Guere, a Paris electrician. Instead of the bell with a hammer, and a spring interrupter, he uses a steel bell which is rotated from the magnet—spring magnet is fastened in the bell in such a way that the ends nearly touch the inner surface near the edge, and the current is broken through the contact—placed just opposite to the bell's outer surface, from which it passes down "a" central supporting rod to the magnet. On closing the circuit, the magnet draws the end of the bell away from the platinum point, interrupting the current. The bell is released from the magnet—spring back to its original position, when the process is repeated, and the rapid vibration set up produces the musical sound, which is the familiar sound so irritating to nervous people.

ONE OF THE MOST energetic students of nature is the Prince of Monaco, the ruler of the tiny nation on earth—a principality of six square miles. His later researches in the study of summer millinery, consisting of Wreaths, Ribbons, Flowers, Featherings, and well equipped steam yacht, the Princess Alice, and during last summer's cruise of this vessel in the vicinity of Azores he was able to witness the taking of a cachalot or sperm whale by Portuguese fishermen. The animal was killed almost under the lee of the yacht. In its death struggles some objects on which it had been feeding escaped from its jaws and by prompt action were secured by the naturalists, while in its stomach were found similar objects in a partially digested state. This food proved to be cephalopods, animals of the class of molluscs including the octopus, squid and nautilus. The cephalopods were of large size—one or two meters long—and represent several new species, including a new species of cuttlefish to no genus or family hitherto known. These animals have long evaded capture, as they neither come to the surface nor lie on the bottom of the sea, and their great agility enables them to avoid all attempts to take them with nets. It is now proposed to carry a whaling outfit on the cruise of the Princess Alice, in order that more whales may be made to give up specimens of the unknown life of the middle sea-lepiths. The use of whales as a geological collector is quite as curious as the use of crabs—no other animal mentioned—as prospectors for coal.
