'The possession or retention of tire-arms is forbidden except in particular cases, when a permit may be issued by the Governor, which is likewise revocable at any time. Many fur-bearing animals which were at one time very numerous on the island, have been trapped and destroyed and the number greatly decreased. They may become source of revenue if allowed to increase, and for this purpose I have forbidden that hunting shall be carried on.

the hunting of seals whales is reserved. This fishing will carried on under a special regulation in order to insure the preservation of the fish as well as the animals. and will be conducted in such a manner as to be a source of profit to

sailing craft without a nominal permit, giving its measurements, tonnage and any time. All craft must bear on the hull and sails a visible number, together with a mark on the stern of the vessel.

'The appropriation of any wreckage, or in general, of any thing or animal which may be stranded on the shores of the island, is forbidden, and, except in the case of shipwreck or damage to a vessel, no craft shall load or unload cargo except by permission of the administration.

'All births, marriages and deaths which take place on the island must be reported to the administration or its representatives in each district. The rule, of course, is subject to the regulations and laws of the dis tricts of Canada.

'In the interest of the public health, the interment of bodies wherever friends or relatives may desire, will not be permitted. Cemeteries will be established at convenient places on the island and duly consecrated. All interments must take place there.

'As a matter for further precaution for the public health, it is decreed that upon the outbreak of a contagious disease the fac must be reported immediately to the ad ministration, that proper precautions may be taken. All residents of the island upon arriving here must submit to vaccination. which will be repeated yearly.

'All the ports on the island will be subject to the international sanitary laws.

'The offal and other waste resulting from the fishing industry must be disposed of in a manner which meets with the approval of the administration, in order that the health of the residents may not be jeopardized.

'No animals of any sort or description can be imported except by special permission, and after having been visited and passed by the veterinary officials of the island. Especially in the case of cattle will the quarantine regulations be enforced. They will be secluded for a certain length of time for the purpose of observation, and will also be subjected to vaccination as a preventive against tuberculosis.

'The lighting of fires for the purpose of burning trees, weeds or bushes is forbidden. Special permission will be given to light fires for the purpose of clearing land, etc. 'The father, mother or guardian of minors

and the employers of servants will be held accountable for their acts. 'Any infringement of the rules will be

considered a cause of revocation of the lease or contract which may exist or of permission to remain on the island.

This consisted of ten dollars for each schooner, two dollars per capita for each man on such schooner who was actively engaged in fishing, and twenty per cent. of the catch.
