A remarkable and probably unique method of avoiding the disfigurement which often results from the loss of an eyeball has been described by Dr. E. Oliver Belt, of Washington. To prevent the common sunken appearance the artificial eye which has long been a problem for ophthalmogists, as well as to ensure a firm holding of the artificial eye, he inserts a globe of fine sponge, into which the healthy tissue grows, gradually absorbing it. This novel operation has been performed in five cases. with fairly good results in all. It is claimed that the method not only has advantages over others in recent cases, but that in cases in which the eye was removed long ago, the sunken appearance

may be remedied by reopening the wound and inserting sponge.

The idea that the spleen is an organ of defense against microbes has been tested by Messrs. Courmont and Duffan, biolo gists of Lyons.
