The Canadian Lumberman is responsible more saw and shingle mills within its borders than any county in the Dominion. A mill owner has been known to take his team of exen, working with head yoke, such as is seen in very few places outside the county, go to the woods, get a log, haul it to the mill, saw it into shingles, load then on his waggon, and go to Bridgewater or Liverpool, trade the shingles for a barrel o flour and take it home, taking three to four days' time in the operation. This he would call "business." While it may not be business in the ordinary acceptation of the term, it is getting comparatively, quick returns. Lumbermen are proverbially hospitable, and Lunenburg lumbermen are no exception to the rule.

Milk should not be saved from cows that have recently calved. This is an oft-repeated injunction-especially at this season of the year -but different dairymen put various constructions upon it. All the way from the third to the tenth milking is saved. according to established habit, or the dairy intelligence prevailing. The subject is best understood by saying that the yellow viscid colostrum, or first milk, develops into milk within a certain limit of time subsequent to calving. This time, although variable in the majority of cases, has taken place by the fourth day of parturiency, so that the ninth milking is pure enough to save. Before this the fluid has not reached a stage where its constituents are in proper and healthful proportions. It is rich, but rich in waste material-fatty degenerated cells. Such milk is only useful for the young calf. -American Agriculturist,

The death of Richard Hocken, Esq. took place at his residence last Thursday evening about ten o'clock. The event was not unexpected, although his last illness was of comparatively brief duration. 


