he had had personal experience of their efficiency and had found them to be exceedingly efficient. Mr. Laurier opened his remarks with the customary compliments to the mover and seconder of the address, and having skilfully dodged the school question, dragged into the debate that somewnat stale bogie, the exodus, and bragged of Liberal successes the recent bye-elections, took a more pleasing turn and for a few minutes directed his attention to those paragraphs in the address with which he could agrie. And these were neither few nor unimportant. As Mr. Foster afterwards pointed out, of the eighteen paragraphs in the address, Mr. Laurier agreed with about one-hali. He was pleased with the bountiful harvest. and still more pleased that it was attributed to Divine Providence, instead of the National Policy. He tiffied the Northwest Mounted Police, with whom it would appear he also had some personal experience during his trip to the Northwest; praised Industrial Schools, which he admitted were well conducted and doing much good, and approved of the re-arming of the militia. but hoped there was no jingoism about reference to the "defence." At five o'clock he returned to the Manitoba School question, and for about twenty minutes he juggled with it and danced around it in the same manuer he has been doing any time the last five years without ever once expressing an opinion on the merits of the question. Mr Laurier's speech was by no means a great one, but it was delivered in his usual charming style, and was pleasant to listen to.
