Andree's Experiment. Berlin advices of 19th inst. say:— The best scientific opinion here is not sanguine of the success of Herr Andree's undertaking. Further details have been received as to the exciting circumstances under which the ascent was made from the Island of Tromsø in the midst of a strong wind, which frequently blew in fierce gusts. The cock had carefully stowed in a small barrel the first dinner to be eaten aloft, and Herr Fraenkel took along a few bottles of beer for the Englishmen. Y., July 24.—Two wandering Russians, a trained bear, a horse and five women bicycle riders in bloomers engaged in a mixup on the road near New Hamburg, Dutchess County, yesterday.
