STEAM AND SAIL. If Miramichi builders do not construct as many sea-going vessels as they formerly did, they are maintaining their record for steamboating, for we believe there are more of these craft to be launched within a few months than in any past season.

Mr. Jas. Desmond is making excellent progress with Mr. Snowball's big paddle-wheeled steamer on the public wharf, where he has also laid the keel of the smaller wheel-water tug for the same gentleman.

Mr. Patrick Desmond is also master builder of the pilot-schooner under construction at the Crimmin pier, east of the Dominion Government wharf. This vessel will be 57 ft. over all, the keel being 48 ft. long, stem overhanging 4 ft. and stern 5 ft. in breadth, and 12 ft. 3 in. wide, and 5 ft. deep.

Mr. Roddick is to put the boiler, engines and other fittings into the tug-yacht, the hull of which he built last autumn. The boiler, machinery, etc. of Mr. Henry O'Leary's new steamer are being ready at the Mills Foundry and Machine Works and that substantial craft will be ready for business early in the coming season.

Capt. Harry Eagles bought a handy propeller tug in Robinson last fall and will use her in towing next season in place of the "Grip."

Mr. Jas. Neilson is building a new tug, which is, we believe, for Messrs. Anderson and Church Point. Mr. Henderson is building the hull at Douglas town and Mr. Neilson has the engine ready in his shop, Canada St., Chatham, where he is also building the boiler, which is to be a water-tube one on the same principle as those in the Florence, Mr. Hutchinson's tug and one of those owned by Messrs. A. & R. Loggie.

The "Zala," Mr. Thos. Power's new wheel boat is not, by any means, a new craft, but we are informed that she will be as good as new when she gets a new hull in 1898. She is now being put in shape for next season's work under the eye of her owner, who is entitled to be classed with our most successful steamboat owners, although he does not classify his tug amongst the beauties of the Miramichi fleet.

The Miramichi and Tourist Travel. On Wednesday afternoon, 10th inst., a meeting of the Chatham Board of Trade was held in the rooms of the Y. M. C. A. The object was to hear Mr. R. A. Corwell, secretary of the N. B. Tourist Association, and take some action for the promotion of tourist travel.

Mr. W. S. Loggie, president of the Board occupied the chair, stated the purpose for which the meeting was held, and introduced Mr. Corwell.

Mr. Corwell explained that other duties, and visits to other places had heretofore prevented him from visiting Chatham, as he had long desired to do in connection with the work of the Tourist Association.

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Board would highly approve of the government of New Brunswick making a substantial grant to aid the Provincial Tourist Association, believing that very beneficial results would follow therefrom.

Mr. D. G. Smith said that as the line would be an inter-provincial one the Dominion government could be called upon to subsidize it, and he had no doubt that something could be done in that direction by the friendly influence of the president and others.
