Robert Copeland's Wonderful Escape

Robert Copeland, a former resident of Newcastle, had a very narrow escape from death a few days ago in the Occidental mill. Eureka, Humboldt Bay, California. It is quite a coincidence that the mill in question is under the management of Mr. Jas. A. Loggie, a Miramichi man, the physician attending Copeland who is Dr. Willard Sinclair, a son of Edwd. while Mr. Capeland, with his assistant, Robt. Owen, was putting a belt on a pulley of a small counter shaft near the ceiling on the west side of the fireroom. The men were working on a small hanging platform and had just slipped the belt on when in dodging beneath the belt it is believed a portion of Copeland's clothing was caught between the belt and pulley. At any rate the first Owen knew of anything being wrong was when he heard Copeland call out: "Hold on there!" and on looking around saw his fellow workman being raised off his The next instant the man's body was evolving with the shaft. With great presence of mind Owen started for the line shaft belt to throw it off, but before he could reach it he heard the thud of a falling body and on looking back saw Copeland lying on the little platform stripped of very vestige of clothing, except his shoes and stockings, and even the legs of the tockings had been torn off evenly with the

After being taken to the watchman's room man and found that no bones had been broken. His body, however, was covered with contusions and abrasions, the latter looking like burns made with a rod of hot iron. He also complained of soreness in the abdominal region but in the physician's opinion he has not received any internal njuries and as soon as suitable clothing could be procured he was ordered taken to

What makes Mr. Copeland's escape wonderful is the small space through which us body was carried, the shaft upon which ne was wound, revolving at a distance of with a massive wooden stringer to which i s hung. According to Owen's account o the mishap when the man's body commenced to revolve it was stretched length wise along and with one arm hooked about the shaft while the other arm hung down loosely would account for Copeland's body passing through the small space between the shaft and the timber. Just how he came to be in that fortunate position or whether or not he instinctive'y placed himself, not even Copeland himself knows. From Dr. Sinclair, the injured man's

The boys who have been in the habit of spending their evenings in the place are not the toughs of the town but the sons of respectable mechanics and in some cases of business men. 
