A bullet went right through the Aberdonian's helmet. knocking it off his head, and on stooping to pick it up he got another bullet through his left arm near the shoulder. The poor chaps were dropping on every side of us. How we climbed the height and dislodged the enemy is too well known to repeat. I did not see Piper Findlater fall during the rush. but I saw Piper Wills standing on the extreme edge of the cliff playing away for
