The Halifax Fair. The Nova Scotia Provincial Fair which opens in Halifax to-day bids fair to eclipse all former fairs held in that city.

The Nova Scotia Provincial Fair which opens in Halifax to-day bids fair to eclipse all former fairs held in that city. Owing to the exhibition being extensively advertised the exhibits are very large amounting to upwards of 9000 and come from Ontario and Quebec as well as the Maritime Provinces.

The building for poultry is too small for the number of entries made, and will be enlarged. The cattle show will be the largest ever seen in the Maritime Provinces and a number of additional stalls are being built.

Entries have already been received for about 150 coops of poultry, over 300 head of cattle, 115 hogs, outside the speed competitors, 75 head of swine, not including litters.

The 245 class is the only race which has not filled, and another event, probably running, will be substituted. The entries for the 245 class include Special Bland 2184, Minnie, 2191, Ardright, 2192, Katrina, 2211, Providence, 2287.

The St. John Exhibition. Our St. John exhibitors furnish lengthy reports of the exhibition which is now being held in that city and which, up to the present, has been a great success.

Yesterday the exhibition was in full running order in all its departments, although it was late in the day when the finishing touches had been put on the poultry and agricultural halls. There is a growing conviction that the upper part of the agricultural building is too small for the purposes to which it is devoted and that more space is required to display the fruits and root crops in such a way that visitors can have a chance to inspect them thoroughly.

As things now are, although Sept. 20th has made the best possible use of the space, potatoes, cabbages, squash, carrots, beets, etc., are either so huddled together as to cause confusion or so scattered as to be useless for purposes of comparison. What has been done for poultry in the erection of a proper building, will have to be applied to the fruit and farm produce departments before another exhibition is attempted. So too, with the carriages. The drill shed is overcrowded, and other arrangements must be devised to properly accommodate them.

Militia News. OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—Amongst militia general orders issued today are the following:—73 Northumberland Battalion of Infantry—Lt. Col. Samuel U. McCulley on completion of his term of service in command of this battalion is transferred to the reserve of officers. Quartermaster and Honorary Captain Robert Murray is granted the honorary rank of major under the provisions of paragraph 94 regulations and orders for the militia, 1897.

67th Battalion, Carleton Light Infantry—Lieut. Col. John Dignan being on completion of his term of service in command of this battalion is transferred to the reserve of officers 25th August.

Men of the Day. Postmaster-General Mulock, to whom the Toronto Board of Trade tendered a reception the other day, was born at Bond Head, January 19, 1843. His father was a physician, and represented the County of Simcoe in the Upper Canadian Assembly in 1829. Mr. Mulock was educated at the Newmarket Grammar School and at the University of Toronto. He was called to the bar in 1865, and appointed Queen's Counsel in 1890. He has held the position of Vice-Chancellor of his alma mater since 1881. He was first returned to Parliament in the general election of 1882, and at once took a leading position there. On the formation of the Liberal Union he accepted the position of Postmaster-General. No department of the Government was in more need of the work of a courageous and capable administrator and Mr. Mulock has re-created it. The achievement, on account of which the Board of Trade's reception was tendered, is only one of a series of radical reforms and changes which he has instituted. For his work in bringing about ocean penny postage Mr. Mulock has received the unstinted praise of the British press. [Toronto Globe.]

British Columbia Politics. VANCOUVER, Sept. 16.—Other matters of momentous interest have side-tracked politics for the time being in British Columbia. There is little or no interest in the bye-elections of the ministers on Saturday, 19th inst. Mr. Cotton and Mr. Martin will not be opposed in Vancouver, as the Conservatives do not wish to take party action in consideration of the feelings of Conservative members of the provincial house on both sides who wish to see which way the cat is going to jump first, when the government meets the house. F. C. Cotton, finance minister, and Joseph Martin, attorney-general, will be re-elected by acclamation. In this connection, Mr. Cotton has editorially declared himself opposed to party lines in provincial politics. Being a staunch Conservative he will be placed in a peculiar position at the next general provincial election, as the Conservatives declare for party lines in the next general contest whether it takes place in a month or four years. In Nanaimo Mr. McKeevie will not be opposed as minister of education, and Premier Selwin will be allowed to have a walk over. Mr. Hume, of Kootenay, minister of mines, is rumored, may have opposition, but the rumor is not believed. Messrs. Bostock and Greff, the Liberal leaders, are endeavoring to secure his election by acclamation.
