> ADVANTAGES OF FALL PLANTING It is oftentimes argued that if a tree is planted in the fall it will become established in its position and make some root growth before the ground freezes and before the leaf growth begins in the spring. Card of Neb staion, to the effect that the fall planted trees made some root growth in the autumn succeeding planting and in the spring before the leaves started. 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
