The Miramichi Pilotage Difficulty.

A good many of the pilots who have been bringing ships into and taking them out of the Miramichi during the past season are very naturally complaining that they have not yet been paid anything for their services foregoing regulation. the commissioners, who have many thousands of dollars of the pilots' earnings in their hands-or rather on deposit in one of the banks as a commissioner informs us. It is an unquestioned fact that the men who are complaining have done certain work and thereby earned money. The natural inference is that they ought to have the benefit of their earnings. It is well known that an unpleasant condition of affairs, which may be expressed by the term, "strained relationships," exists between the com missioners and the pilots whose resignation of their positions as such, were accepted early in the pilotage season, just closed. We ventured on Tuesday to make some enquiries relating to the situation as it is today, particularly with the view of learning why the pilotage money in the commissioners' custody was not available for distribu-

tion. On the part of the commissioners it is stated that they had hoped for a settlement of the differences between them and the old pilots at the time Captain Douglas was here holding an investigation. That prospect was, however, shut out by thepilots taking injunction proceedings while Capt Douglas' investigation was going on. After Judge Barker had decided against the injuntion, the pilots were approached in behalf of the commissioners with a view of coming to an amicable arrangement for a settlement of the differences between them. We are told by a commissioner that he had succeeded in getting a promise from pilot master Robert Walls that he would endeavor to get a majority of the pilots to meet the commis-Mr. Peter Archer has been awarded the stoners in Chatham Town Hall with this object in view, and that a prominent business man-a friend of the pilots-had assisted him to that end. Before this could be carried out, however, the pilots-or a number of them - appeared to have preferred to continue the pursuit of what they considered to be their rights by again appealing to the equity court in the form of injunction

The Lobster Regulations.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.-Lobster regulations have been finally adopted by Sir Louis Davies and approved by the cabinet. They provide as follows :-No one shall fish for, catch, kill, buy,

sell, or have in his possession. lobsters :-Between the last day of May, and the fourteenth day of December in each year, both days inclusive, along the coast of New Brunswick, embracing the county of Charlotte and also on that part of the coasts of Nova Scotia, embracing the counties of Yarmouth, Shelburne, Queens, Lunenburg, and that part of the county of Halifax west of the line running S.S.E. from St. George's Island, Halifax harbor, and coinciding with the farewell buoys in the entrance of said harbor. The size is to be 9 inches in length, measuring from tory. the head to the tail exclusively of claws or

Between the last day of June of each year, and the fourteenth day of January, idle this winter. both days inclusive, fishing is prohibited in any part of the Bay of Fundy or any part of the coast, inside of a line drawn from the division line of the counties of Charlotte and St. John, near Point Le-10t inches within these limits.

fishing is prohibited on that part of the coast of Nova Scotia from the aforesaid line, running S.S.E. from St. George's Island, Halifax harbor, Nova Scotia, and coinciding with farewell buoys in the entrance of the harbor, extending eastward to and following the coast line, as far as Red Point between Martin Point and Point Michaux, in the island of Cape Breton and including, Chedibucto Bay and St. Peter's Bay and the coasts and waters of all the islands lying in and adjacent to these bays, and including the coasts and waters of the Gut of Canso, as far as a line passing from Flat Point, in Inverness county, to the lighthouse in

Antigonish county, opposite.

Between the first day of August and Fine the last day of April, both days inclusive, fishing is prohibiled on that part of the coast of Cape Breton, in Nova Scotia, from Red Point, between Martin Point and Point Michaud, in the island of Cape Breton, and extending to, and around Cape North as far as and including Cape St. Lawrence; also the coasts and waters of all the islands known as the Magdaleu Islands, including Bird Rocks and Briar Island, also on the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence from Bay Blanc Sableon westward to the Head of Tide embracing the coasts of all islands adjacent to and including the island of Auticosti.

Between the eleventh day of August in each year, and the twenty-fourth day of May, both days inclusive, fishing is prohibited along the coasts of Northumberland Straits, between a line, on the north west, drawn from Chockfish River in New Brunswick, to West Point in Prince Edward Island and a line on the south east, drawn from Indian Point, near Cape Tormentine in New Brunswick, to Cape Travers, in Prince Edward Island.

From eleventh day July in each year to nineteenth day of April, both days inclusive, fishing is prohibited in any part of Canada or on the coasts or waters thereof, not embraced within the limits describel in the


