Chatham Parish Election. Hardly one-third of the ratepayers of Chatham parish polled their votes in the election for municipal councillors on Tuesday. Even town clerk, M. S. Senon, forgot to give the requisite notice of the event at the regular time, so little did it interest him, but he and M. S. Senon, Jr., were for the fore at the town hall on Tuesday to attend to the polling when 368 voters out of about 1100 cast their ballots, a poll being also held at Loggieville. The candidates were County Warden Jas. F. Connors, Coun. William Kerr, and Mr. Nicholas Cunningham.

The last named person has really become a nuisance by offering himself as a candidate because a few people think it a proper thing to make a joke of the election by inducing him to run. There should be a provision in the law relating to Municipal elections by which candidates who run for various purposes and put the public to unnecessary expense should be required to forfeit an election deposit, just as such candidates do in Dominion and local elections. In St. Andrew's Church. Our St. Andrew's Church correspondent writes:— Rev. D. Henderson, last Sabbath forenoon, preaching in his own pulpit referred to each length to the fact of the British Empire being at war and said that war was to be deplored. Every true Christian, said the preacher, viewing mankind as a great brotherhood, must look with grief on contending hosts in the battlefield. But Great Britain had not provoked this war. She hated war, but she hated still more oppression and cruelty and she was to-day at war because she was called to fight for God and humanity, and her sons who had fallen, or would fall in South Africa had died and would die for the sacred cause of humanity and civilization. The empire was involved in a no more justifiable war during the present century. The congregation of St. Andrew's would follow with intense interest the career of their brave and loyal fellow-worshippers now on their way to the seat of war. These young men, as well as the rest of the Canadian contingent were showing to the world a noble example of British loyalty and patriotism. They had left their homes and friends to undergo the hardships and dangers of war, in order to maintain the honor of the British flag in a distant part of the Empire. They went forth with the heartfelt good wishes of their fellow-citizens and fellow-worshippers; and Mr. Henderson expressed the hope that a happy return to their respective homes would quickly follow the victorious career of the young men who went forth from St. Andrew's church. The congregation seemed in hearty sympathy with the patriotic sentiments of their pastor and delighted with the trend of his discourse. At the close of the service the National Anthem was finely and heartily sung by the congregation.

Rev. D. Henderson is announced to preach his regular monthly sermon to young men on Sabbath evening next.

For South Africa. The New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island volunteers who are sent for service in South Africa received very enthusiastic greetings everywhere as they went on their way to Quebec last Wednesday. It is estimated that 15,000 people assembled at and near the St. John Railway station to cheer and wish them God-speed. At Sussex, Moncton and other points there were enthusiastic crowds. The Fredericton squad joined the others at Chatham Junction. The steamer Nelson was crowded on a special trip from Chatham to Newcastle on Wednesday night, when many of our people, accompanied by the Chatham Citizens' Band, went to give the Miramichi soldiers and their comrades a send-off. The train was several hours late, but it made no difference. The crowd waited at the station until 10 o'clock Thursday morning. When the train was approaching the bridge played, (the Newcastle Orange Band being along on hand) and continued to play and the crowd composed of all classes—men and women, boys and girls—cheered. Our own men of the contingent were found by their friends and hearty good wishes were expressed to them. Mayor Winslow gave to Major Weeks, who commands the Maritime contingent, two sovereigns each from the Chatham fund for the Chatham men under his command. Speeches were made by Major Weeks and Mayor Winslow, good-byes were said and the train moved off, all cheering with great enthusiasm.

The men had a great welcome in Quebec. They left for South Africa on Monday afternoon, the Governor-General, members of government and hosts of friends and relatives being present to see them off.

Mayor Winslow has received the following letter from Joseph Letson, one of the Chatham men, and it will no doubt be read with interest by his many friends here:—

QUEBEC, Oct. 28th, 1899. To His Worship, Mayor Winslow, Chatham. DEAR SIR:—On the eve of sailing I thought it my duty to drop you a line about the boys. We thank you very much for the good send-off you gave us in Newcastle; also for the two sovereigns which were very much appreciated. The boys are all contented and happy and all anxious to do something for Canada. Our new uniforms have been issued to all of us, together with everything a soldier requires for active service. We are to have a parade of the regiment to-morrow. We have been told by British imperial officers that the regiment, as a body is the best men they have ever seen, and I think they are. The men have

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
