Upon reaching my office I found your note of 11th instant awaiting me, giving substantially the same information as you had communicated by telephone.

As you are aware, the further hearing of this mation as adjourned till this morning at Chatham, when I fully intended and was prepared to go on with the evidence on behalf of the pilots. I had a number of witnesses to examine, masters of vessels, lumber shippers of the port, and the pilots who had not already been examined. In fact, the case of the pilots was just beginning to be put in proper shape.

The instructions from the Minister to close the investigation at once practically shuts the pilots off

The instructions from the Minister to close the investigation at once practically shuts the pilots off from making a full presentation of their case, and if such is the intention of the Minister then I say that it is a most unjustifiable exercise of power and manifestly unjust and unfair to my clients. Under the circumstances what value can be attached to any report you make? Can you truthfully say that you have fully investigated the matters in dispute, and that all parties have had a fair and reasonable opportunity of being heard before you?

I am forced to the conclusion that the same in

fluence that was brought to bear to prevent an investigation in the first instance is still operating to the disadvantage of the pilots, but I can assure you that full inquiry into the matter cannot be stifled, and that the public will demand that the rights of all parties shall be protected.

If the investigation had continued, it was my intention to produce testimony to show that by the action of the commissioners the shipping interests of the port were seriously endangered. of the port were seriously endangered;
That the object of the commission in changing the regulations at the time and in the manner in which

the change was made was intended to financially benefit some if not all of the commissioners; That the persons licensed to act as pilots were unfit to perform the duties and incompetent, and that masters of vessels who know the facts would not employ them;
That the difficulties could have all been amicably arranged had the commissioners been desirous of

doing so.

I must, therefore, protest against the investigation being thus prematurely closed and against any report being made on such an abortive investigation.






