

[Continued from 2nd page.] MISDIRECTED ATTENTION.

He thought it would have been more appropriate if, instead of grieving over the woes of St. John, the honorable member (Hazen) representing as he did a rural sonstituency, (and by the skin of his teeth) had dropped a kindly little word for the county of Sunbury. Perhaps it was because the majority was so small that the honorable member's solicitude for Sunbury was small. The fears felt by Mr. Hazen that Mr. Robertson's interest in the winter port might suffer, might receive an answer later. The estimates were liable to talk louder than even his honor's speech, and Mr. Robertson was a business man.

FOOLISH FIGURING.

Mr. Hazen took great pleasure in whittling down the government's majorities and claimed that a turn over of 1200 voters would have upset the government. Possibly, but it was sure that a targover of five votes would have left Mr. Hazen out in Sunbury ; 120 votes defeated Mr. Hazen's colleagues in Westmorland ; and a change of 12 votes would have deprived the house ol the Robinson Crusoe of the opposition (Mr. Shaw). A complete analysis of the election returns for the province showed that the change of 147 votes would have simply left a goose egg on the other side of the house. (Laughter.) It was awful to contemplate such possibilities. But Mr. Hazen overlooked the 5,800 electors in Gloucester who were unanimous for the government. The independent vote






