The fire ing sub-section of the Highways Act, which the Empire is openly preached by a section is now in force :-

'Oo and after the first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the wheels of every vehicle loaded with stone, gravel, sand, or other material of any kind or nature whatsoever, when the load exceeds in weight one and a half tons, shall, when used and passing over or along any highway, be provided with tires not less than four inches wide; the owner or person in charge of any such vehi-

cle, shall, for every offence against this Section, incur a penalty of five dollars."

Almost Burned to Death.

A terrible accident occurred at St. George's Settlement, in the Parish of Beresford, near Bathurst, two weeks ago last Thursday. While three of Mr. James H. Comeau's children, aged respectively, 5, 7 and 14






