The desirability of efforts being made to develop the manufacture of small lumber and of the surplus wood, of which there is a

great waste in the production of deals and other large lumber has, no doubt, been the subject of much thought on the Miramichi and at other North Shore lumbering points, as it has al-o beeen of occasional treatment in the ADVANCE. A few weeks ago we made reference to a shipment of eeveral carloads of box shooks by Messrs. Haley Bros., from Charlotte county, via Montreal, for the British market and remarked that some of our North Shore people, with their plenitude of material and advantageous shipping facilities, ought to make such business pay if Charlotte county shippers could do so.

We knew, at the time, that Mr. T. W. Flett, of Nelson, was a shook manufacturer, but had no idea that he was doing, perhaps, the largest busin ss of the kind in New Brunswick and, finding the Canadian field too small for him, was manufacturing exclusively for transarlantic markets. Our reporter visited his establishment at Nelson a day or two ago and, although Mr. Flett does not appear to be desirous of letting everybody know what he is doing and of giving information as to the full extent and ramifications of his business, he courteously accompanied the ADVANCE representative through his mills and enabled him to see their operation and the process of turning out their products.

About one-twentieth of the wood used by Mr. Flett in making box shooks comes from the refuse of the gang mill, the balance being these undersized logs from granted


