A Durban correspondent, telegraphing under date of March 24th, says that the Boers in the Transvaal capital think they can hold out from four to six months, when they firmly believe that intervention will force Great Britain to grant favorable terms including independence. They look to Germany and the United States for intervention. Pretoria is being prepared for a siege. Mines have been laid and other preparations made. The prisoners there are accorded better treatment. They have an ample supply of bread, and each man is allowed a pound of meat weekly. At Waterfall, where there are over three thousand prisoners, the situation of the

camp is unhealthy. The shelter for the men is insufficient, and there is therefore considerable sickness. The spirits of the prisoners have been raised by the news of the British successes brought by the most recent captives.






