The paper manufacturers of Canada met at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, last Thursday and formed an association for the control of prices. Eighteen out of the twentytwo firms in the Dominion were represented. and it was expected that the remaining four will also j in. The first step of the new association was to advance prices twenty-five per cent on news, wrapping, note and other kinds of paper.

One result of this is that middlemen and large dealers generally are seeing the twentyfive per cent raise and going from thirty seventy-five per cent better against their customers, such as printers, stationers and other dealers in that class of stock. The people who insist on cut prices at small offices, hereafter, will no doubt succeed in bankrupting more than the usual percentage of such concerns, and there is no business which greater financial mortality occurs. 
