The Apostolic Delegate at Bathurst

His Excellency Mgr. Diomede Falconic Archbishop of Larissa and Papal Delegate to Canada, who has been making an official visit to the bishops of the Maritime Provinces, arrived here last Friday evening by accommodation train.

Long before the arrival of the train about three thousand persons in teams and on foot had gathered in the vicinity of the I. C. R. station to welcome His Excellency to our town. Mgr. Falconio, who was accompanied from Chatham by Mgr. Barry and a number of clergymen, was received at the station by In the eight days spent by the party on the Bathurst town and village church committes in charge of Rev. W. F. Purcell, assistant to Mgr. Barry, and Rev. W. Varilly, of the Village, and escorted to team of handsome grays driven by Mr. P. P. Foley. The line of march was immediately formed in the following order :- Mr. K Bateman, marshall, the Village band, the Micmac Indians, Town and Village church committee, His Excellency with Bishop Barry and Rev. The procession was the largest ever seen on the north shore, and covered a distance of over two miles.
