

Certain Philadelphians, so far from joining in the cry against Great Britain which is so marked a feature of American politics, have formed a society composed of many men powerful in the financial and political world, who pledge themselves to work for an open alliance with that country. The first meeting of this organization, which is known as the Transatlantic Society of America, was held about a fortnight ago. The proceedings were kept secret, but the plans have now become known through an application in court for a charter. In a circular which is to be sent out, it is stated that the purpose of the society is to be fulfilled by the distribution of literature, in which will be published refutations of the erroneous impressions which may obtain in regard to the relations between the two countries, by lectures and addresses on commercial questions and on subjects which will aid the work of the organization, and by the formation of a library and readingroom and by the publication of journals and books, which will further the plans

of the society.

A unique method of cheating the postal revenues and thereby saving a few cents has been reported to the Post Office Department here from Niagara Falls, N. Y. That city has a good many English people for residents, while it is annually visited by thousands of tourists from the British Isles. ### The Judgment in the Case of the Town of Chatham against J. D. Creaghan.

Following is the test of Mr. Justice McLeod's judgment in the case of the Town of Chatham vs. J. D. Creaghan Queen vs. John D. Creaghan,

The bye-law prohibits the erection of wooden buildings' within a certain district, and the charge was for having erected this building within this district. The old building was existing at the time the Town was incorporated, and at the time the bye-law was passed, but part of it was torn down. In re-building it was lengthed about four feet. I have gone over the Act carefully, and it seems to me that authority given to the Town to make bye.laws, is contained in the 64th section of the Act Chapter 44 1896, "The Towns Incorporation Act of 1896, the 49th sub-section of section 64 of said Act, reads as follows: "To provide for the security, safety and advantage of the inhabitants, by such rules and regulations and restrictions as may be deemed expedient to be observed by all persons in the erection of baildings, to be built within the populous part of the Town," I can find no other section dealing with these matters.

My rendering of that section is, that the Town have a right to look to the security, safety and advantage of the inhabitants in the erection of the building, but I do not think that that gives them the right to say that a wooden building shall not be erected Rather under the sub-section it seems to me that they should see whether it was built | that in his hands the government of Italy securely and safely, and not whether it is of brick or wood. CO., Nur-"My dear friends and companions: I give you to-day notice of the horrible fate that has come to me, not of my own will, but compelled to act by the grand and brave society to which I belong. That is to say, the anarchists. In a few words I will tell you to the best of my ability. In the first place, on February 2, at a drawing at Milan, as to whose lot it would be to kill the King of Italy, that lot fell to me, but I being an American the society has left it to my full liberty to choose as a substitute whomsoever I wish. So I, seeing this brute animal, Gius Pipessina, who did not respect anybody, who ill-treats his own countrymen and his friends, and, more than anything, he did not respect either sons or nephews. I was content to choose this one.'

MILFORD, Mass., July 30. - General Wm F. Draper, United States ambasaador to Italy, when informed of the assassination of King Humbert, was very much affected. 


