Having secured a lamp that is satisfactory, a little intelligent care will enable you to secure good results from Fill the bowl with oil every morning if it has been used the night before and clean the flues until they are bright and shining. Trim the wick daily, cutting the charred portion off with sharp scissors, even with the top of the tube. The burners are apt to become gummy and clogged, and cannot give a good light while in that condition. Put them in a strong soap suds once a week, and boil them ten or fifteen minutes. Polish with dry flannel, and it will be like a new burner. Keep the wick turned low when not lighted to prevent the oil from oozing out over the top. In putting out the light, do not blow down the chimney.
