ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING. The annual meeting of St. Andrew's Church was held in the hall of the church last Wednesday evening, and was very largely attended. Mr. A. A. Anderson was chairman. Rev. D. Henderson, the Pastor of the congregation, read a most satisfactory report on behalf of the session, showing a net increase of 16 in the membership, and a net increase of 20 in the families.

From the reports read by Mr. Anderson, chairman of the trustees, Mr. Geo. Stothart, secretary, and Mr. D. P. MacLachlan, it appeared that financially the past year has been marked by great progress in St. Andrew's. The income for the year for current expenses, exceeds the expenditure by over \$150.00. The total revenue for the year was \$5,400.00, of which amount the Sabbath School (Mr. W. S. Loggie, supt.) raised \$190; Ladies' Aid Society (Mrs. A. A. Anderson, president) over \$300; C. E. Society (Mr. Andrew Barr, president) \$175; Junior C. E. (Miss Wright, supt.) over \$20. The amount raised for the schemes of the Presbyterian church by St. Andrew's last year was \$542.00, being about \$200.00 in excess of the previous year. The outlook for the congregation is most hopeful.

NOTICE. Extracts from Act of Assembly 60, Vict. A. D. 1897. The property to the amount of Five Hundred dollars of wife deserted by her husband and compelled to support herself, and where the whole property was a widow, as well as the property she resides as elsewhere, is under the value of Fifteen Hundred dollars, and such property supports minor children of her own or of her deceased husband, her property in the parish where she resides shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of Two Hundred dollars; and also to the extent of One Hundred dollars for each minor child wholly supported by her. If she has no property in the parish where she resides, then such exemption shall be allowed in the places where such property is situated, but such exemption shall not apply or extend to school taxes.

NOTICE TO HOLDERS OF TIMBER LICENSES. The attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is called to Section 19 of the Timber Regulations which reads as follows:— "19 No Spruce or Pine trees shall be cut by any Licensee under any License, not even for poles, which will not make a log at least 15 feet in length and ten inches at the small end; and if any such shall be cut, the Licensee shall be liable to forfeit his License and the License be forfeited!" and all Licensees are hereby notified, that in the future, the provisions of this section will be rigidly enforced.
