DRAPERY BOATING CATASTROPHES:—A red Cedar Hill, some 50 miles above Matapedia last Wednesday afternoon, resulting in the drowning of a fishing party of six persons, namely: James King, a well-known lumber merchant of Quebec, and ex-M. P. for Megantic; Mrs. Nolin, wife of R. Nolin, manager of Kings Bros. saw mills, her son, and three men named Joseph H. Pierre, Alfred Deschamps and Joseph Fournier, all single and aged about 20. The party were out fishing in Lake Metopedia, about 4 o'clock, when a sudden gale sprang up and upset their sail boat throwing all into the water. The lake is very deep and has many eddies. Many witnessed the accident from the shore, but there being no boat available, no assistance could be rendered. It was fully an hour before a boat could be procured and search made for the bodies, some of which are not yet recovered.

FUNERAL OF REV. FREDERICK W. HARRISON

The large attendance of all classes at the funeral of the late Frederick W. Harrison, which took place last Thursday afternoon, showed that the deceased former pastor of St. Luke's was held in high esteem on the Miramichi. The remains were removed to St. Luke's Church at one o'clock from the residence of W. B. Snowball, Esq., where they had rested since their arrival from Jacksonville. The solemn funeral service in the afternoon was participated in by Rev. G. M. Young, pastor of St. Luke's; Rev. Dr. Read, representing the Methodist Conference, and Rev. D. Henderson, pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. Short addresses were made by Rev. Messrs. Young and Read, and as the congregation viewed the remains, the Dead March in Saul was played.

The casket was borne from the church and into the hearse to the grave by six members of St. Luke's quarterly board, viz.—Messrs. S. McLean, L. H. Abbott, Wm. Mather, Richard Walker, John Reid and Geo. Tait. Amongst the mourners were Fredk. Harrison, son, and Rev. Messrs. George and Charles Harrison, brothers; Chancellor Harrison of New Brunswick University, and W. B. Snowball, prominent citizens of Chatham, Newcastle and other principal centres of the county were also in attendance. The service at the grave was conducted by Rev. Messrs. Young and Read and the interment was at Riverside Cemetery.

About our Summer Weather.

A Journal (letter) called on Prof. E. Stone Wiggins and showed him the following telegram in last evening's Journal: "Paris, June 18.—Albe Mareux, the astronomer, has discovered and sketched through the big telescope in the Optic Palace of the Exposition a remarkable spot on the sun, forming a part of an extensive group and having a diameter of nearly four kilometers. This spot, he says, will remain for seven days and become visible to the naked eye. He predicts the appearance of other spots in July, August and September, inferring that the heat during those months will be very great."

"What is your opinion of this prediction, Professor Wiggins?" said the reporter. "My opinion is that Albe Mareux is a better astronomer than I am a philosopher." "You mean then that while you doubt that there is a great spot forming on the sun, it may not cause great heat on the earth?"

"Precisely so. Sir William Herschell originated this theory, that is, that the greater the number of solar spots the greater the terrestrial heat. He compared these solar appearances as given by Lalande for past years with the price of wheat as recorded in Smith's 'Wealth of Nations,' with results favorable to his theory. Dr. Thomas Dick, who was also a distinguished astronomer, on comparing his own observations with the condition of the harvests and the weather, arrived at an opposite conclusion, namely, that the fewer the spots the higher the temperature on the earth, and that in those years when the spots are numerous the seasons are colder and more productive of vegetation. This was remarkably the case in the year 1816, when the spots were extremely numerous and when the harvest was so scanty that the price of bread was doubled in England. That was the coldest summer ever known in North America. For very many years 1816 was spoken of in New England as a year without a summer. The year 1836 was a similar example. The sun during the summer of that year was never free from large spots, and it was the coldest for twenty years, that is, since 1816. All my observations for the last twenty-nine years, however, tend to show that the solar spots in no way affect the temperature on the earth. The difference of the seasons is entirely due to other causes."

Dominion Day Celebration.

We understand that a meeting was held at the Town Council chamber on Monday evening under the auspices of the Town Council for the purpose of considering the subject of celebrating Dominion Day. There was no large attendance of citizens as there would, doubtless, have been had the matter been taken up earlier and adequate notice been given. The mayor presided, and a gentleman who was present informed our reporter yesterday that it was determined to call citizens to illuminate their residences and Capt. Mackenzie and some others were authorized to get up a display of fireworks.

Our reporter, like many other citizens, had no previous notice of the meeting referred to, and the ADVANCE is, therefore, not in a position to inform its readers as fully as it otherwise might do in regard to the celebration, had its representative been afforded an opportunity to be present at the meeting.

A Distinguished Visitor.

Monsieur Falconio, papal ablegate, arrived in Halifax Saturday evening from Montreal. He was met at Truro by delegates from different Roman Catholic parishes and accompanied to the city. He drove at once to St. Mary's cathedral, and the ablegate is a guest at the archbishop's residence and Saturday night was the guest of honor at a dinner at the archbishop's, which was attended by Lent. Gov. Daly and the leading Roman Catholics. At 9 o'clock on Sunday morning he celebrated mass at St. Mary's and assisted at 11 o'clock mass. He remains in Halifax until to-day, Thursday, going thence to Antigonish, thence to Charlottetown, P. E. I.

of the strangest features of the accident. Crashing after the engine came the seven freight cars—some box cars and some flats. The engine and tender were completely submerged, there being some 15 feet of water there. As the cars fell they struck one upon its neighbor and so remained, forming a chain of cars from river bed to the solid span of the bridge which rests on the Edmonston bank. The stacking of the cars seemed to keep the solid span and make much on this span of the bridge. It is appalling to think what would have been the results had there been a less number of freight cars to the train, the whole line of cars might have plunged into the river, carrying the passengers to their doom.
